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

## Geothermal: The Other Renewable Energy


## What is geothermal energy?

"Geothermal" literally
means "heat from the earth."
Geothermal energy is a
renewable heat source found
under the surface of the earth. It
is reliable because it is always
available, regardless of weather
conditions. Geothermal is also
clean, with emissions as low as
solar, wind, and hydropower.



## What are geothermal heat pumps?

- » Geothermal heat pumps (GHPs) are clean, efficient systems for heating and cooling that can be installed in various ways.
- » GHPs may also supply your home with a steady stream of hot water, reducing your energy costs.
- » GHPs take advantage of constant underground temperatures to efficiently exchange temperatures, heating homes in the winter and cooling homes in the summer.
- » The diagram to the right shows what types of GHP systems are available for use in homes and other buildings.



Based on a 2,500-square-foot home in the Midwest. Electricity: \$0.12/kWh - Natural gas: \$1.50/eef-Fuel oil: \$2.28/gal. - Propane: \$2.19/gal.

## Why are geothermal heat pumps good for cooperative members?

- » They have the lowest operating cost of any heating/cooling system available to members today.
- » They are recognized by the EPA as a renewable energy source.
- » Federal tax credits are available for residential and commercial properties.
- » ECI REC offers rebates.
- » Members may qualify for ECI REC's special Heat Plus rate.
- » They provide consistent comfort.
- » There is no outside central air conditioner noise.
- » The heating/cooling system is located inside the home.

## Advantages over other renewables

Geothermal heat pumps are not affected by:

- » Snow coverage
- » Overcast days
- » Extreme wind
- » Extreme temperatures
- » GHPs use electricity to transfer heat to and from the ground, so they help bring in revenue rather than take it away.

**SEVERE WINTER WEATHER** couldn't stop employees and directors from lowa's electric cooperatives as they traveled to downtown Des Moines to discuss concerns and priorities with state legislators during the 2024 Welcome Back Legislative Reception. The lowa Association of Electric Cooperatives hosted the annual reception on January 9 in conjunction with the lowa Biotechnology Association, the lowa Communications Alliance, the lowa Institute for Cooperatives, and FUELlowa.

The event provided a valuable opportunity to meet with state legislators at the beginning of the 2024 session and discuss issues that impact rural electric cooperatives and the communities we serve. For example, we're concerned about the potential establishment of Integrate Resource Plans (IRPs) in lowa Code. IRPs would essentially force the early retirement of carbon-based electric generation facilities, resulting in stranded costs and reliability concerns for the member-consumers we serve. lowa's locally owned and governed electric cooperatives continue to support an "all-of-the-above" power generation strategy that ensures reliable and affordable electricity for our members.

In the coming months, the Iowa General Assembly will be addressing a multitude of issues, including energy-related matters that are central to Iowa's rural economy. Beginning with the Welcome Back Legislative Reception, Iowa electric cooperatives will again be important advocates for a balanced approach in addressing energy issues. We're hoping for better weather for our annual REC Day on the Hill event on March 12. Learn more about electric cooperative advocacy efforts at iaruralpower.org.

#### Official contest rules

Iowa Electric Cooperative Living magazine will award one allexpenses-paid Youth Tour trip to Washington, D.C., in addition to the Youth Tour trips sponsored by local electric cooperatives like ECI REC. The contest is open to:

- » Any lowa high school sophomore, junior, or senior whose family is served by an lowa electric cooperative
- » Any lowa high school sophomore, junior, or senior who attended all three virtual sessions of the lowa Youth Leadership Academy in October 2023

Students who have already applied for the Youth Tour through ECI REC may also enter the essay contest to enhance their chances of earning a trip. However, students chosen to be sponsored by ECI REC will become ineligible to win the trip sponsored by *Iowa Electric Cooperative Living* magazine.

Magazine and IAEC staff will judge all essays anonymously. The decision of the judges will be final. The winner of the contest will be announced on April 4, after all sponsoring local electric cooperatives have chosen their 2024 Youth Tour participants.

## One lowa Youth Tour student will receive a \$1,000 college scholarship!

A student from each state that participates in the 2024 Youth Tour will be chosen to serve on the national Youth Leadership Council (YLC). The lowa YLC representative will be selected during the Youth Tour trip and will receive a \$1,000 college scholarship.

These young leaders will meet virtually throughout 2024 and participate in leadership training, practice their public speaking skills, attend cooperative forums, and engage in community activities like voter registration drives.

The Youth Leadership Council experience will culminate at the March 2025 NRECA Annual Meeting held in Atlanta, Georgia. The group will spend a few days reflecting on the experiences they've had throughout the year, attend informational and entertaining conference sessions alongside electric cooperative leaders from across the country, and solidify lifelong friendships and connections!

### **Grain Bin Clearance Notice**


AS REWARDING AS IT MAY BE, farming is an extremely difficult job-it ranks among the top 10 most dangerous professions in the United States. At ECI REC, safety is a top priority for both our employees and our members. That's why we are required by the Iowa Utilities Board to provide this annual notice to farmers, farm lenders, grain bin merchants, and city and county zoning officials.


The State of Iowa requires specific clearances for electric lines around grain bins, with different standards for those filled by portable and permanent augers, conveyors, and elevators. Whether you're purchasing new grain bins or remodeling areas with existing bins, you must consider proximity to overhead power lines. The drawings accompanying this article show the specific clearances required for both scenarios. If you have any questions concerning the drawings, please contact your Cooperative.

According to the Iowa Electric Safety Code, which is found in Iowa Administrative Code Chapter 199 - 25.2(3) b: An electric utility may refuse to provide electric service to any grain bin built near an existing electric line that does not provide the clearances required by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C2-2017 "National Electrical Safety Code," Rule 234F. This paragraph "b" shall apply only to grain bins loaded by portable augers, conveyors, or elevators built after September 9, 1992, or to grain bins loaded by permanently installed augers, conveyors, or elevator systems installed after December 24, 1997. (As adopted by the Iowa Utilities Board.)

#### **Use Caution When Burning Ditches**

Burning helps clean things up, but it can also cause extensive damage to Cooperative property, resulting in electric service problems.

Members involved in such fires may be invoiced for damage they cause to Cooperative property.

#### TWO TIPS FOR SAFE BURNING

- Green, or newer, poles are more susceptible to burninguse extra caution.
- Always be aware of the locations of poles, anchor guy assemblies, underground cabinets, and other important Cooperative equipment when burning.

#### **VENTILATION AND CIRCULATION**

- » Ventilation fans (BESS lab rated at 0.10 in static pressure): \$3/in. (fan blade diameter)
- » Ventilation thermostat controllers with humidistats: \$25 each
- » Circulation fans (BESS lab rated at thrust/ kW requirements): \$1/in. (fan blade diameter)
- » High-volume, low-speed fans (minimum 10 ft. diameter): \$35/ft. (fan blade diameter)

#### **DAIRY OPERATIONS**

- » Dairy heat reclaimers: \$5 per milking cow
- » Dairy milk pre-coolers: \$4 per milking cow
- » VSD vacuum pumps: \$40/horsepower
- » Scroll compressors: \$250 each (must replace reciprocating compressor)

#### LIVESTOCK EQUIPMENT

- » Electric-heated livestock waterers: \$50 each(≤ 175W per trough opening)
- » Single-crate heating pads: \$25/pad (≤ 85W)

- » > 100W, \$40/fixture

Some conditions apply. Refer to the equipment rebate forms at **ecirec.coop** for qualifications and detailed requirements.

FIND OUT YOUR HOME'S ENERGY USE

Look at your energy bill(s) to review kWh usage for the past 12 to 24 months and calculate the average monthly usage.

**CONTACT YOUR ELECTRIC UTILITY** 

Because most residential systems are tied to the power grid, reach out about safety and connection requirements and fees.

**LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION** 

Start considering panel location. Assess the age, size, and condition of your roof as well as available ground space.

**DO YOUR HOMEWORK** 

Ensure the company you are considering has installers who are specially trained and certified to install solar, among other factors.

**GET SEVERAL QUOTES** 

There are costs other than equipment, such as permitting, installation, and inspection. Make sure all costs are included in quotes.

## Installing On-Site Generation? Members Must Notify ECI REC

**FOR YOUR SAFETY AND OURS**, owners of alternative energy production facilities that will be attached to an electric transmission or distribution line are required to notify their utility. If you have questions, please contact ECI REC at 877-850-4343.

No matter how small, the owner of the facility is required to provide written notification to their utility of their intent to construct or install the facility at least 30 days prior to construction. In the written notice, you must provide information on the type of facility (solar-powered heat pumps, for example) and the anticipated completion date of the construction.

Alternative energy production facilities are defined as solar, wind turbine, waste management, resource recovery, refuse-derived fuel, agricultural crops or residues, or wood-burning facilities that are used to generate electricity.

### **April Is Safe Digging Month**

Spring is near, and you may be planning outdoor projects. Whether it's a deck addition, planting a tree, trenching in fields, or a landscaping masterpiece, remember to call lowa One Call by dialing 811 before you dig. Although light gardening typically doesn't call for deep digging, other seemingly simple tasks like planting shrubs or installing a new mailbox post can damage utility lines. A severed line can disrupt service to an entire neighborhood, harm the person digging, and potentially result in fines and repair costs.

# 2023 ECI REC Reliability Review

a Keeping the Lights On update

As we continue our commitment to keeping our membership connected, it's important to shed light on the factors that influence the outages experienced by our members. By understanding these causes, we can collectively work toward enhancing the reliability of ECI REC's distribution system. The graph here illustrates the causes of outages in 2023 and the percentage of impact each category was responsible for.

The categories shaded in green represent outages ECI REC could reasonably expect to control.

Thanks to our ongoing commitment to Work Plan improvements, vegetation control, animal protection, and system design, we had a record-setting year in 2023, with the lowest ever outage minutes in these categories (28.2 minutes per member-account). The remainder of the graph represents the categories that could not be directly controlled by ECI REC. These categories include power supply, public-caused outages, and planned outages.

While 2023 was a relatively quiet year weather-wise, ECI REC is nevertheless very proud of our accomplishments. It is truly a team effort to reach these goals. Congratulations to our directors and employees on their ongoing commitment to providing the best possible service to our members!

Patronage represents the margins, or profits, that the Cooperative earns on electricity purchased by its member-accounts. These margins are the member-accounts' equity in East-Central lowa REC. The Cooperative uses this equity to maintain its poles and wires, rebuild its distribution system, and pay expenses. When ECI REC's financial condition allows, these margins are returned back to the members who generated them. In the past 10 years, ECI REC has returned \$5,261,706 to its members.

#### **Privacy Policy for East-Central Iowa REC**

Our Commitment to Privacy: At East-Central Iowa REC, confidentiality is very important to us. As we continue to improve and expand our services and delivery channels, we recognize our customers' need and desire to preserve their privacy and confidentiality. East-Central Iowa REC recognizes the trust you have placed in us and is committed to safeguarding the privacy of our customers' information. The following policy affirms our continued commitment to preserving customer confidentiality.

The Information We Collect: We receive and retain information about our customers through many

- » Information we receive from you on applications or other forms;
- » Information about your transactions with us, our affiliates, or others; and
- » Information we receive from a consumerreporting agency.

The Way We Use Information: We limit the use and collection of nonpublic personal information to that which is necessary to maintain and administer financial services. We do not share this information with outside parties unless:

- » The information is provided to help complete a customer-initiated transaction (such as credit reporting agencies, document processing companies, etc.);
- >> The customer has requested it;
- » The disclosure is required by law (e.g., subpoena, investigation of fraudulent activity, etc.); or
- » The disclosure is required by banking regulation (e.g., Fair Lending Reporting Act, Home Mortgage Disclosure Act).

When customer information is provided to any of the third parties just mentioned, that third party must agree to adhere to privacy principles that provide for keeping such information confidential.

Limiting Employee Access to Information: East-Central Iowa REC limits employee access to customer information to those with a business reason for knowing such information. All of our employees are educated on the importance of confidentiality and customer privacy. Any employee who violates the financial privacy of our customers will be subject to appropriate disciplinary measures and possible termination.

Protection of Information via Established Security Procedures: To prevent unauthorized access, maintain data accuracy, and ensure the correct use of information, we have put in place appropriate physical, electronic, and managerial procedures to safeguard and secure the information.

Maintaining Accurate Information: We have established procedures so that our customers' financial information is accurate, current, and complete in accordance with reasonable commercial standards. East-Central Iowa REC will respond to requests to correct inaccurate information in a timely manner.



your Cooperative. While the decision to raise electric rates is not an easy one, our continued commitment to maintaining a high level of service comes at a cost. When we prepared the 2023 budget, we expected a significant increase in our wholesale power cost. Thankfully, this did not happen. Instead, our power supplier (CIPCO) lowered our rate twice during 2023. These decreases were passed on to you via the Power Cost Adjustment (PCA). We had projected an average PCA of \$0.012/kWh, but it ended up being half of that at \$0.006/ kWh. This provided an annual savings of \$86 for a residential member-account. We appreciate the trust you place in us, and we remain steadfast in our commitment to delivering value for your hardearned dollars.

Our power supplier lowered rates twice in 2023. ECI REC used the power cost adjustment to pass those decreases on to 9,206 member-accounts. This resulted in an average savings of \$86/residential member-account.

#### **Investing in our future**

Looking ahead to 2024, we will continue implementing strategic investments to further strengthen your Cooperative. A significant portion of our budget will be allocated toward plant upgrades, ensuring that our infrastructure remains resilient and capable of meeting the

evolving energy needs of our membership. This includes rebuilding over 31 miles of overhead distribution lines, as well as investing \$3.9 million in Work Plan projects (see 2024 Construction Work Plan budget).

Additionally, your Cooperative continues to invest in upgrades and new technologies. Initiatives for 2024 include a wireless network upgrade, as well as phone system and digital updates for internal communication.

#### **Prioritizing maintenance for long**term sustainability

Regular inspections and our vegetation management program proactively address potential issues and extend the lifespan of the Cooperative's distribution assets. In 2023, the Cooperative invested over \$380,000. For 2024, \$360,000 is earmarked for maintenance programs. This commitment to maintenance is essential for preserving reliability and minimizing future service disruptions.

#### **Investing in our greatest asset:** our people

Your Cooperative's strength lies in the dedicated individuals who work tirelessly to keep the lights on for you, the member-consumer. During 2023, we invested over 2.100 hours in employee development. Most of this investment went to our number-one priority: safety! In 2024, we will continue to invest in our workforce through training programs and professional development opportunities. By nurturing an innovative and dedicated team, we ensure that your Cooperative remains a leader in providing reliable, affordable, and sustainable electricity.

In closing, we express our gratitude for your continued support. I also hope my message helps you connect with our 2024 theme: Energizing Tomorrow: A **Resilient Journey of Innovation and Dedication.** Together, we are building a brighter and more resilient future. AS WE USHER IN A NEW YEAR, let's take a moment to reflect on the successes and milestones of the past year and share our vision for the future. It can be said that 2023 was indeed a remarkable year for your Cooperative, filled with historically low outages, lower power costs than projected, and strategic investments in our infrastructure, maintenance, and employees.

#### Low outages, high reliability

One of the key highlights of 2023 was a record low outage total of 28.2 average minutes per member-account. This number is based on the outages we could control. It does not include planned/scheduled outages or outages caused by the public or power supplier. A big thankyou to our dedicated team of lineworkers and support staff, which responds and restores power as quickly and safely as possible. Our continued investment in plant upgrades, proactive maintenance program, and good weather also played a big part.
