Iowa Youth Return from Washington, D.C.

THIRTY-EIGHT HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS representing Iowa's locally owned electric cooperatives were in Washington, D.C., on June 14–20. They joined more than 1,900 other students from across the nation for the 61st Electric Cooperative Youth Tour.

“The Youth Tour is the highlight of the summer for many students, and we were proud to send 38 of Iowa's best and brightest to our nation's capital this year to participate,” said Chuck Soderberg, Executive Vice President of the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives. “These students gained a firsthand understanding of the legislative process and made connections with other student leaders from across the country that will last a lifetime.”

Iowa's electric cooperatives were among the first to send students on the tour back in 1958. This year, Jacob Ludeking and Kaylee Kleitsch were sponsored by East-Central Iowa REC.

Jacob attends Benton Community High School and is the son George and Theresa Ludeking of Norway. He is an

honor roll student. His school activities include speech, band, show choir, musicals, and plays. He is an Iowa Ambassador of Music and serves as a reporter for the Benton Community FFA Chapter. Jacob's activities outside school include the Florence Go-Getters 4-H Club. At his church, Jacob has been an altar server and an assistant fifth-grade religious education teacher.

Kaylee attends Wapsie Valley High School and is the daughter of Richard and Brenda Kleitsch of Fairbank. She is an honor roll student. Her school activities include archery and being a student ambassador representative. Kaylee is also a member of the Wapsie Valley FFA Chapter. Kaylee is a teacher's assistant and is part of the Talented and Gifted Program (TAG), choir, chamber choir, and musicals. Her activities outside school include the Atom Bombers 4-H Club and teaching Vacation Bible School.

EACH OCTOBER, ECI REC joins 30,000 cooperatives nationwide to celebrate National Co-op Month, which recognizes the many ways cooperatives are committed to strengthening the local communities they serve. “By the Community, For the Community” is the theme for this year’s celebration, spotlighting the countless ways cooperatives meet the needs of their members and communities.

“ECI REC provides electricity to more than 8,700 member accounts in

our 11-county service area,” said CEO Steve Marlow. “Delivering safe, reliable, affordable power is our top priority, but we are also invested in our communities because we are locally owned and operated. Revenue generated by ECI REC goes back to Main Street.”

Rural America is served by a network of approximately 1,000 electric cooperatives, most of which were formed in the 1930s and 40s to bring electricity to the farms and rural communities that large, investor-owned power companies

had no interest in serving because of the higher costs of serving low-population and low-density areas.

In addition to providing the vital power cooperative members depend on, ECI REC engages with local communities through electrical safety demonstrations, the RECare program, Youth Tour, scholarships, and much more.

Get Smart: Combine Auto Banking and Budget Billing

a Keeping the Lights On article

Looking for a way to make payments easier and access your crucial account and usage information quickly? **SmartHub** is the answer.

Using **SmartHub**, ECI REC members can quickly view and file bills using any computer or smartphone. After registering, you can receive your electronic bill via email.

You can also use **SmartHub** in combination with direct

payment and budget billing to significantly streamline your month-to-month financial planning. With direct payment, you pay automatically each month by electronic direct payment from a bank account or credit card. The direct payment form can be found online at ecirec.coop.

Then, add budget billing so you know what amount you will pay each month. Your monthly payment is calculated based on your 12-month usage history or the usage history of the past occupants of your residence. Accounts are periodically reviewed to ensure that payments match actual usage so you do not face a large debit or credit at the end of the year.

There are several ways you can enroll in budget billing:

This question is important because:


1. As the national conversation includes climate change and clean energy themes, we want to make sure energy policies discussed won't shift the costs to our member-consumers, making their power less affordable.

TODAY MORE THAN EVER, what is happening in Des Moines, Iowa, and Washington, D.C., can impact your cost of power and its reliability. Through political action committees (PACs), members can support the campaigns of those officials who have shown themselves supportive of our goals. Because it is illegal for cooperative funds to be contributed to election campaigns, these PACs rely on donations from cooperative employees, directors, and members like you.

The two PACs members can consider donating to are the Action Committee for Rural Electrification (ACRE), which sends funds to candidates for federal elections, and the Friends of Rural Electrification (FORE), which supports candidates running for state office. Electric Water Heaters Offer Many Benefits

an Energy Wise feature

ARE YOU IN THE MARKET FOR A NEW WATER HEATER?

If you already have an electric unit, you know the benefits; but if you have a propane (gas) water heater, or are

contemplating one, here are a few points to ponder.

Safety – An electric water heater requires no venting, no gas line, and offers no CO₂ concerns.

Space – The water heater space allotment in your home often determines what will work best. An electric water heater installation requires zero clearance.

Maintenance – Electric water heaters are very low maintenance; there are no moving parts and no pilot lights to be concerned with.

Price – An energy-efficient 50-gallon electric water heater will cost a family of four about \$40 per month to operate. Electric rates are considerably more stable than gas. For example, East-Central Iowa Rural Electric Cooperative's price per kilowatt-hour has increased 4.6% (less than a half a cent) over the past 10 years. Installation costs are also considerably less with an electric water heater.

Energy Efficiency – Consider the ultimate in electric water heating with an air source heat pump water heater. With an efficiency rating of at least 2.4 (240%), they are the most efficient water heaters on the market today.

Incentives – Buy a new, energy-efficient electric water heater and receive a \$75 rebate. Receive a \$650 rebate for the purchase of an air source heat pump water heater.

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Turn off kitchen, bath and other exhaust fans within 20 minutes after you're done cooking or bathing. When replacing exhaust fans, consider installing high-efficiency, low-noise models.

Take Steps to Prevent Electrical Fires During Fire Safety Week

ELECTRICITY IS AN ESSENTIAL part of our everyday lives. Because of this, it can be easy to let our guard down when it comes to our safety around it. Yet, electrical hazards in our homes can develop if left unchecked.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), an estimated 37,900 home fires were reported in 2014 that involved electrical distribution and lighting equipment. These fires resulted in approximately 530 deaths, 1,290 injuries, and \$1.4 billion in property damage.

The Red Cross estimates that after a fire has started, you have just two minutes to escape your home. In order to exit your home safely, education and preparation are your best tools for staying safe. **With the two-minute goal in mind, construct and communicate with all family members about an escape plan.** Look for two ways to exit each room in the home, and practice emergency evacuation plans several times a year. Choose a meeting place outside of the home.

Smoke detectors can be life-savers. The Red Cross reports that 60% of fires occur in homes without working

alarms. **Install working smoke alarms on each level of the home.** Test these alarms monthly and replace each smoke alarm at least every 10 years.

The following checklist can help find possible issues with your electrical system or appliances before they become a fire hazard in your home:

- ✓ **Electrical outlets** – Check for loose plugs and wall receptacles. Replace missing or broken wall plates so wiring is not exposed. If you have young children, install tamper resistant outlets (TROs). Avoid overloading outlets.
- ✓ **Electrical wiring** – If an outlet is not working, have an electrician check it out. If light switches are hot to the touch or lights spark and flicker, immediately shut them off at the circuit breaker and contact a qualified electrician to make repairs.
- ✓ **Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCIs)** – Install GFCIs in your kitchen, bathrooms, laundry, workshop, basement, garage, and outdoor outlets.
- ✓ **Arc Fault Circuit Interrupters (AFCIs)** – Consider installing AFCIs on circuit breakers; if they

detect any abnormality, they shut the system off, preventing fires.

- ✓ **Plugs** – Do not remove the grounding pin (third prong) to make a three-prong plug fit a two-conductor outlet.
- ✓ **Cords** – Make sure cords are not frayed, under carpets or rugs, tightly wrapped around objects, or located in high-traffic areas.
- ✓ **Light bulbs** – Verify that your light bulbs are the intended wattage for the lamp or fixture they are in, and make sure they are screwed in securely so they do not overheat.
- ✓ **Service capacity** – As you add more appliances and electronics, your home's electrical service capacity may get overburdened. If fuses trip frequently, you may need to increase the capacity of your electrical service or add new branch circuits. Call a qualified electrician to assess.

Scam Alert: Be Wary of Fraudulent Phone Calls

a Safety reminder

ON JULY 8, 2019, one of our members received a fraudulent call in which the caller identified himself as an ECI REC employee. The caller told our member he needed to pay his electric bill right away, or he would be disconnected within the hour. The caller also gave a fictitious work order number and a call-back number of 818-478-9732.

This call did not come from ECI REC and serves as a reminder to all to be wary of phone scams. If you receive a call of this nature, do not give your personal information to the caller. Call our office directly to check the legitimacy of the call. ECI REC personnel will be able to provide members with specific account details, which this scammer was not able to do.


HARVEST SAFETY TIPS FOR FARMWORKERS

- **Maintain a 10-foot clearance** around all utility equipment in all directions.
- **Use a spotter and deployed flags** to maintain safe distances from power lines and other equipment when doing field work.
- **If your equipment makes contact with an energized or downed power line, contact us immediately** by phone and remain inside the vehicle until the power line is de-energized. In case of smoke or fire, exit the cab by making a solid jump out of the cab, without touching it at the same time, and hop away to safety.
- **Consider equipment and cargo extensions of your vehicle.** Lumber, hay, tree limbs, irrigation pipe and even bulk materials can conduct electricity, so keep them out of contact with electrical equipment.

Downed and Dangerous

If you see a downed power line, always assume it is energized and dangerous. Avoid going near it or anything in contact with the power line.



Downed power lines can energize the ground up to **35 ft.** away – so keep your distance.



Never drive over a downed line or through water that is touching the line.



If you see a downed line, notify the local authorities immediately.



Never try to move a downed power line, even if you think the line is deenergized or if you're using a non-conductive item – this will not prevent injury or death!

Make upgrades now to save this winter

Requirements (with or without LIHEAP)

- » Must have electric heat and/or central air (homes with natural gas do not qualify).
- » Home must be built prior to 2000.
- » Must be upgraded to existing home (new additions do not qualify).
- » Project cost must be \$150 or more (labor costs for self-installed projects cannot be included).

Electric Heat (with or without air conditioning)

- » Attic/Ceiling Insulation - 60% up to \$600
- » Wall Insulation - 60% up to \$600
- » Foundation Insulation - 60% up to \$600
- » Infiltration Control - 60% up to \$200
- » Duct Insulation/Sealing - 60% up to \$200

Maximum rebate per home \$2,200

Central AC Only (non-electric heating)

- » Attic/Ceiling Insulation - 15% up to \$150
- » Wall Insulation - 15% up to \$150

Maximum rebate per home \$300

LIHEAP Qualified (See LIHEAP weatherization income guidelines to the right)

Electric Heat (with or without air conditioning)

- » Attic/Ceiling Insulation - 80% up to \$800
- » Wall Insulation - 80% up to \$800
- » Foundation Insulation - 80% up to \$800
- » Infiltration Control - 80% up to \$200
- » Duct Insulation/Sealing - 80% up to \$200

Maximum rebate per home \$2,800

State Releases 2019-2020 LIHEAP Requirements

an Energy Wise update

THE 2019-2020 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps qualifying low-income Iowa homeowners and renters pay for a portion of their primary heating costs for the winter heating season. The assistance is based on household income, household size, type of fuel, and type of housing.

HOW TO APPLY FOR LIHEAP

WHEN TO APPLY

- » Elderly (60 and over) and/or disabled: October 1, 2019, to April 30, 2020
- » All other households: November 1, 2019, to April 30, 2020

WHAT TO TAKE

- » Proof of income for all household members age 19 and over (most recent three months' check stubs, award letter from Social Security, or 2018 tax return)
- » Social Security numbers for **all household members**
- » Recent heat bill
- » Recent electric bill

WAGE EARNERS

- » Please bring copies of your check stubs for the three-month period preceding the date of application, or a copy of your federal income tax return.

FIXED INCOME

- » This income may include: Social Security Benefits, Supplemental Security Income, Family Investment Program, Veterans Assistance, Unemployment Insurance, and pensions. Please bring copies of your most recent three months' check stubs.

SELF-EMPLOYED/FARMERS

- » Please bring a copy of your most recent federal income tax return.

FIP RECIPIENTS

- » Please bring your current DHS Notice of Decision or contact your local office for acceptable document information.

If you receive alimony or child support, it will also need to be verified.
